The Beillevaire Letters (1879-1937)

Dr. Juliette Champagne

It is a mature 32-year-old priest who decides to answer Bishop Grandin's call for help for his Missions in the Canadian North-West in 1879. Already well set up in the Diocese of Nantes, it is with great generosity that this little giant of a man comes to work with the Indigenous people here, and finally chooses to work with the Métis who settled along the Battle River. His letters to his family in France, many of which were published in religious periodicals, tell of the opening of the territory, from the starvation of the natives, the Métis uprising in 1885, the coming of settlers and of the extraordinary hardships he had to surmount and of the great joys he had in his ministry and his life.

Settler Suffragists and the Edmonton Equal Franchise Campaign, 1905 - 1916

Dr. Carter – Henry Marshall Tory Chair in the Department of History and Classics; University of Alberta

Highlighting the key Edmonton individuals and their organizations who worked for Alberta's 1916 Equal Suffrage Bill, this talk draws on a new book by Sarah Carter, <u>Ours by</u> <u>Every Law of Right and Justice: Women and the Vote in the</u> <u>Prairie Provinces</u> (2020). A surprising number of diverse and colourful characters emerged during the years of struggle to achieve this goal, though far from all Albertans could vote after 1916. "Equality" was for some only.
